If the family has kids old enough to show in Jr. Showmanship maybe talk that up quite heavily -get the kids involved and the parents will follow.

Maybe we could do a Briard Fun Day in different areas of the country. Invite all owners to participate – make it free. Have a fun dog show, have someone show them obedience/rally/agility and let them give it a try. Find a place where we can rent sheep and show them herding – anything to get them interested in the many different activities the dog world offers.

What issues do you see facing the BCA that you would like to see the Board address in the next 2 years?

Again, I think the biggest issue is getting new people involved. Like so many other breeds, we need new breeders and exhibitors.
